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INTRODUCTION / HISTORY



There is a marvelous evolution that brings the Art Of The African Diaspora organization to the public as the longest running event of its kind, within the San Francisco Bay Area's oldest established Art Center, The Richmond Art Center (RAC). It originated from a salon for African American artists known as Colors of Black that was organized in 1989 by artist and professor Marie Johnson Calloway.

In 1996 artists Jan Hart-Schuyers and Rae Louise Hayward influenced by Prof. Calloway, established The Art of Living Black exhibit with the welcome support of the Richmond Art Center. Many of the artists from Colors of Black participated in that inaugural exhibition, which presented the work of emerging and established African American artists. The artists gained introductions to new audiences, and access to build a creative community of artists and art lovers. Over the next twenty-six years the Richmond Art Center's commitment, in presenting the exhibitions, ensured the increased visibility for African American artists in the Bay Area that Hart-Schuyers and Hayward conceptualized. After the loss of both founders, their organizing efforts were carried on for several years by family members, the RAC and various activists artists.

The next stage of development happened in 2018, when a Steering Committee comprised of participating artists, presented the exhibit. In 2019, the Committee became aware of the necessity to ncorporate a broader vision of the African Diaspora and consequently renamed the organization, Art Of The African Diaspora.

This diversification includes many of the original participating Artists of the initial exhibition in 1989.

Those who have joined to the present day, feel the importance of this year being the 27th Anniversary of an extraordinary collaboration worth celebrating.

We welcome the public to continue intentionally supporting African American visions / stories.





SALUTE TO OUR FOUNDERS JAN HART-SCHUYERS



Jan Hart-Schuyers was the esteemed co-founder of The Art of Living Black (TAOLB) in 1997. She wore many hats as an artist, educator, administrator, community organizer and art visionary. This Bay Area Black Artist Exhibition "Art of the African Diaspora" is inspired by her vision.

Admired by so many, her innate talent and gifts overflowed. She was known for her sculpture, but also worked in paper-mache masks, oil paintings, her "Mikala" dolls or fabric figures, and stained glass. Jan was the program coordinator of adult classes at Studio One in Oakland, where she taught stained glass classes, among other media types. She was committed to a community that supported arts and its artists, serving as the former president of Pro Arts, the co-chair of the East Bay Open Studios and a member of boards and committees such as the Emeryville Arts Celebration.



In 1997, Jan collaborated with Rae Louise Hayward and brainstormed the brilliant idea of initiating an open studios event and exhibition geared toward artists of African descent. With strong creative energies flowing, the two were able to recruit 35 artists for their first exhibit.

The premiere exhibition was held in the Community Gallery of the Richmond Art Center. The show grew from 35 artists in 1997 to 119 in 2019. Jan unfortunately passed away due to illness in 1998. Prior to her death, she had envisioned expanding opportunities for artists where they could show-case their diverse creative talents.




Jan's creative mind and innovative spirit was to be a force that keeps on giving. Today, Art Of The African Diaspora recognizes and celebrates Jan and her vision through the Artistic Achievement Award, where three exhibiting artists are selected as recipients each year.

SALUTE TO OUR FOUNDERS RAE LOUISE HAYWARD



Rae Louise Hayward was born in New Orleans and raised in the Los Angeles area. Inspired at an early age by supportive parents, she began her art training at Pepperdine College from 1967 to 1970 and earned a degree in art from Cal State Northridge in 1971. She moved to the Bay Area in 1987 and began actively creating art in 1990, selling her first painting in 1991.

Her colorful art celebrates the beauty of the African culture; its people, sculpture, textiles, jewelry and music. She incorporates a number of African motifs in her art using various mediums including acrylics, collage, oil pastels, ink, and color pencils. Her work was recognized by KQED Television in 2003 with a Local Heroes Award in honor of Black History Month. Rae also served as a board member of the Richmond Art Center and the Women's Caucus for Art.



Rae Louise passed away in Jan 2008 due to illness, just prior to the annual exhibition. She was an endearing coach and a leader, participating until her final days. Many artists cite how they appreciated her moving them off the fence and into full exhibition mode due to close conversations with her. One artist's words: "Rae changed my life as an artist. Her support, from my very first year of showing made me feel like my work was important and valuable. She welcomed me into her creative community like a true sister, and under her leadership this organization has felt like a family to me."

Today, Rae's forethought and vision continues to benefit artists, art supporters and communities. African American artists gain increased exposure by exhibiting their work. Art supporters and communities have new access to African American original art and artists.

Thanks to the commitment and vision of Rae Louise Hayward, Art Of The African Diaspora will continue to celebrate and promote African-American artists around the Bay Area today and into the foreseeable future. This 2023 Exhibition features over 130 Artists.









SALUTE TO OUR FOUNDERS MARIE JOHNSON CALLOWAY



Marie Johnson Calloway was born in Baltimore, Maryland in 1920. She grad uated from Coppin State Teachers College, Baltimore Maryland. She received a Bachelor of Arts Degree at Morgan State College, Baltimore Maryland. She shared her knowledge by teaching in the Baltimore School District for several years. In 1954 she moved to California to increase her teaching prowess after receiving a Master of Arts degree in painting from San Jose State University. She then attended nearby Stanford University as a Graduate Studies Experienced Teacher Fellow. Calloway returned to San Jose as the first woman of color to teach in the San Jose Unified School District. She enriched communities teaching within San Jose State University, California College of Arts and Crafts and San Francisco State University The latter is where she received a Doctoral equivalency. She retired from teaching in 1983.

Setting aside chalk on blackboard instructions, Professor Calloway became more notable as a prolific Painter and mixed media Assemblage artist. Her art was included in solo exhibits presented by the Oakland Museum, California College of Arts and Crafts, Howard University, University of the Pacific, William Sawyer Gallery in San Francisco, San Francisco City College, Triton Museum in Santa Clara, and the African American Cultural Center in San Francisco. Some of her numerous group exhibits included the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (Marie Johnson and Betye Saar), the Studio Museum in Harlem, New York, Richmond Art Center, California Museum of African-American Art in Los Angeles, San Francisco Art Commission, Bennett College in North Carolina. Her art enriches numerous private collections.

In 1989 Ms. Calloway took a more directed step, organizing a salon for African American Artists known as Colors of Black. The goal was to create cohesion within the Black Arts community. The group would meet monthly at local East Bay galleries, Grand Oaks Gallery and later Kalda Gallery. Having formal arts education and then having a prestigious career in arts education, Marie constantly introduced the members to high profile national and regional art professionals, like Adrian Piper from New York. Her approach was to extend

opportunities for networking and mentorship. The group developed a substantial mailing list, maintained an informative newsletter, created art exhibits and events. Ms. Calloway's contacts paired with staff at Black Repertory Theater, the Post Building and local art spaces yielded presentations for Colors of Black members. After a little over a year, Ms. Calloway turned leadership to multi-media artist Candi Farlice. Aside from Candi Farlice, members included Raymond L. Haywood, Patricia Montgomery, Dewey Crumpler, Foad Satterfield. Other artists who joined the membership were Kelvin Curry, Ron Smith, Rae Louise Hayward, Orlonda Uffre and many more. Eventually the group ended up under the stewardship of Rae Louise Hayward who along with Jan Hart Schuyers launched The Art Of Living Black. Several of the artists from both groups continue to participate in what is now known as Art Of The African Diaspora.

The Pantanal, the world's largest tropical wetland complex, spans 44 million acres across Bolivia, Brazil, and Paraguay—an area the size of the U.S. state of Missouri or the Brazilian state of Acre—with Brazil hosting approximately 80% of its floodplains and associated ecosystems. The biodiversity hotspot is home to South America's wildlife "Big Five": jaguars, giant anteaters, giant river otters, maned wolves, and Brazilian tapirs. The Brazilian Pantanal has one of the highest densities in all Latin America of the Panthera onca, also known as the jaguar, with around one jaguar for every 3,000 acres. However, throughout the last few decades, the species—the largest cat in the Western Hemisphere—has lost nearly 50% of its historic geographic range, leading to its classification as "Near Threatened" on the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List of Threatened Species. 

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

Bill Dallas

Bill Dallas may have grown up in Kansas City, but he will always be a Bay Area Art icon.

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, Dallas grew up surrounded by the soulful sounds of blues and jazz. While music profoundly influenced him, his creative journey truly began after his move to Berkeley, California, in 1963. It was there that he discovered a love for painting, a passion that would define his life's work. Dallas pursued this passion by earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1974, where he studied under renowned artists such as Peter Voulkos and Joan Brown.



Dallas developed a unique artistic philosophy he termed Artmatism, or "painting music." This innovative approach drew from the improvisational nature of jazz, translating rhythm, melody, and emotion into bold strokes and vivid colors. Employing a two-handed, brushless technique, Dallas allowed music and life experiences to guide his creative process. "Freedom first, then enlight-enment," he often said, emphasizing the importance of spontaneity and emotional truth in abstract art.

Throughout his life, Dallas traveled to 19 countries, immersing himself in diverse artistic traditions. In Japan, he trained under Master Toshi Yoshida, studying calligraphy, woodblock printing, and sumi brush painting. These influences brought a harmonious balance of Eastern and Western aesthetics to his work, enriching his already distinctive style.

Dallas exhibited extensively across the San Francisco Bay Area, with notable shows in Oakland, Berkeley, and Alameda. His work also reached national audiences in Texas, Chicago, and New York, and earned international acclaim, with pieces included in private collections in Australia, Japan, Germany, and South Africa. Among his most significant exhibitions was a 2021 showcase at the Richmond Art Center, where his paintings celebrated the enduring power of abstract expressionism.

A dedicated contributor to the Bay Area art scene, Dallas was a steadfast participant in the Art of the African Diaspora (formerly The Art of Living Black), hosted annually by the Richmond Art Center since 1997. Twice awarded the Artistic Achievement Award—a rare and exceptional honor—Dallas championed the stories and creativity of Black artists, fostering connection and representation within the art community.

Dallas' work transcended traditional abstraction, often evoking natural landscapes such as fields, mountains, and oceans without directly depicting them. His vibrant canvases, inspired by music, scripture, and life, invited viewers to find their own meanings within his art. From his monumental 6-by-8-foot painting Jonah in the Belly of a Fish to his untitled compositions dictated by sound and emotion, Dallas' creations resonated with raw authenticity.

His artistic legacy is one of exploration and innovation. By intertwining music and visual art, Dallas forged a new creative language that offered audiences a deeply personal yet universal experience. A true visionary, Bill Dallas remains a cornerstone of the Bay Area's artistic heritage and a testament to the transformative power of art.

Patricia Daigre Perry-McGee

Patricia Daigre Perry-McGee was a woman of remarkable talents and a caring heart who left an indelible mark on her community. Born and raised in Berkeley, she graduated from Berkeley High School before moving to Richmond, where she lived for over 40 years.

A dedicated healthcare professional, Patricia earned a Master's degree in Nursing (MSN) and served in roles such as registered nurse, nursing instructor, and director of nurses during her 30-year career. She brought the same compassion and dedication to her profession that



she extended to her family, friends, and community.

In addition to her nursing career, Patricia was a self-taught artist whose work reflected her vibrant spirit. She worked with watercolors, acrylics, oils, and later explored mixed media. Patricia began exhibiting her art in The Art of Living Black in 2002 and became a regular participant at the Richmond Art Center and other East Bay venues. Her last exhibition, due to health challenges, was the 2020 art of the African Diaspora (formerly The Art Of Living Black)

Patricia's artwork was as colorful and warm as her personality, often infused with mythical and spiritual elements that invited deep reflection. Through her art and her life, Patricia shared her passion, faith, and creativity, leaving a legacy cherished by all who knew her.



Ron Smith

Ron Smith, originally from Phoenix, Alabama, was an Oakland artist known for his vivid, soulful imagery and deep connection to the Bay Area art community. A U.S. Army veteran, Ron was a regular participant in The Art of The African Diaspora (formerly The Art of Living Black).

Ron's involvement went back to Colors of Black, a salon for African-American artists founded by Marie Johnson Calloway in 1989, which became the foundation for The Art of the African Diaspora. Even in recent years, while he exhibited less often, Ron was always present at



opening receptions, satellite exhibitions, and special events, showing unwavering support for the community.

Beyond his art, Ron was a beloved teacher at Studio One Art Center in Oakland, The Oakland Fine Art Summer School, and The Feather River Art and Jazz Camp. In 2009, he received the Full Vision Arts Foundation (FVAF) award for his outstanding community service.

Ron believed, "Art is spiritual communication; it is human content translated through feelings and vision into frozen reality." Whether through his art, his teaching, or his legendary sweet potato pies, Ron brought warmth and creativity to all who knew him, leaving a lasting legacy of connection and inspiration.




